Georgia where I'll be the Featured Artist in November, I've accomplished my goal to be able to put down my brushes, pick a shotgun and take Iris hunting. It has been a good year. As we wait for the migration, we've been repairing our duck blind and the goose pit blinds to sink into the corn and wheat fields, and sand bagging our creek to get water where we need it. And plans are afoot for several days in Kansas between Christmas and New Years where we're optimistic about improved conditions for quail and pheasants after some severe drought years. Just in case, we'll haul our trailer full of goose decoys and layout blinds. That can be a great backup. Then it will be back to the studio refreshed and with new goals for 2015. I hope you too have plans that will be just as fulfilling.

A Footnote: On the way to my show at InSight Gallery in Fredericksburg, Texas last September, Ann and I stopped off to see the ranch where I was born by kerosene lamp. The house had been moved into the nearby town of Boerne, and we were invited in to speculate on which room I first drew my breath in. We had left my parents' dream of a ranch life and returned to El Paso when I was just eighteen months old, and I'd never been back. It was a moving experience for me.
